ABSTRACT

This study aims to investigate the effectiveness of applying aspects of connected speech in the spoken language of the MA students at Sudan University of Science and Technology. The Descriptive analytical approach has been adopted. A sample of 50 students from the Department of English language, College of Graduate Studies, SUST, batches 6, 7 and 8, has been chosen randomly to test their ability to apply aspects of connected speech in their spoken language. An oral test has been administrated to collect the research data. The findings have revealed that MA students lack sufficient knowledge of the features of connected speech. Moreover, they do not use these aspects in their spoken English language. The standard of the is below the The students average level. researcher recommended that a priority should be given to teaching ACS, and emphasized the importance of practice. Also, the researcher suggested that further studies and researches should be carried out with in the same area.

مستخلص البحث

سعت هذه الدراسة الى تقصى الصعوبات التى يواجهها طلاب ماجستير اللغة الإنجليزية بجامعة السودان للعلوم والتكنلوجيا فى استخدام مظاهر الكلام المترابط. وقد تم استخدام المنهج الوصفى التحليلى فى هذه الدراسة لجمع المعلومات. كما تم اختيار عينة عشوائية مكونة من 50 طالب ضمن طلاب الدفعة السادسة ، السابعة والثامنة ، قسم اللغة الإنجليزية بكلية الدراسات العليا بجامعة السودان للعلوم والتكنلوجيا ، لإختبار قدرتهم على تطبيق مظاهر الكلام المترابط فى اللغة المتحدثة عن طريق أداء إختبار مقروء لجمع المعلومات اللازمة. وقد أوضحت النتائج التى تم التوصل اليها أن طلاب الماجستير يفتقدون المعرفة اللازمة فيما يخص الكلام المترابط ، بالإضافة الى أنهم لا يستخدمون هذه المظاهر فى لغتهم الإنجليزية المتحدثة. وقد كانت نتائج الآداء العام لهؤلاء الدارسين أقل من المتوسط. يوصى الباحث بإعطاء أولوية للتدرُب على استخدام هذه المظاهر ، كما يوصى بعمل دراسات وبحوث أخرى عن الموضوع.
